


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JEFFERSONVILLE REDEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The Redevelopment Commission promotes and implements community projects, acting as a catalyst to develop blighted areas in need of reinvestment. This process is implemented via real estate acquisition, site preparation, and/or by providing public infrastructure to the site.

The Redevelopment Commission is comprised of five voting members — two appointed by the Jeffersonville City Council and three appointed by the mayor. A sixth, non-voting member, sits on the Commission and is appointed by Greater Clark County School Corporation. The Commission meets the last Wednesday of each month at 5 p.m. in the Mayor's Conference Room on the 2nd floor of City Hall at 500 Quartermaster Court, Jeffersonville, IN 47130.


Seeds get planted and nurtured and eventually take on a life of their own. The most exciting part of both of my jobs is getting to witness the journey.

JEFF MAIN STREET EARNS NATIONAL ACCREDITATION

The City of Jeffersonville is proud of its partners at Jeffersonville Main Street, Inc, which, over the summer, earned the designation as a 2022 nationally accredited Main Street America program.

The nonprofit organization made the list of Main Street America's accredited programs for its exceptional commitment to preservation-based economic development and community revitalization.

Jeffersonville Main Street's performance is annually evaluated by Indiana Main Street, which works in partnership with Main Street America to identify the local programs that meet rigorous national performance standards. Evaluation criteria determines the communities that are building meaningful and sustainable revitalization programs and include standards such as, fostering strong public-private partnerships, supporting small and locally owned businesses, and actively preserving historic places, spaces, and cultural assets.

Last year, Main Street America programs across the country generated \$5.76 billion in local reinvestment, helped open 6,601 net new businesses, generated 30,402 net new jobs, catalyzed the rehabilitation of 10,595 historic buildings, and leveraged 1,427,729 volunteer hours. On average, for every dollar that a Main Street program spent to support their operations, it generated \$19.34 of new investment back into Main Street communities.

In what has become one of his favorite holiday traditions, Mayor Mike Moore is once again asking Jeffersonville students to help create the City’s official holiday card.


“I look forward to this every year,” Moore said. “The response and talent of the students always exceeds my expectations.”

>> *Partnership will shape future of Jeffboat*

The City of Jeffersonville is joining forces with American Commercial Barge Line (ACBL) to develop a masterplan for the development of 80 riverfront acres formerly occupied by Jeffboat.

The announcement came in September through the City's Redevelopment Commission.

As part of an agreement with ACBL, the Commission will fund up to \$200,000 for the costs related to OHM Advisors (Orchard, Hiltz & McCliment, Inc.), which was the planning firm selected to develop the master plan and determine the best use of the property.

Earlier this year, ACBL engaged The Wheatley Group (TWG) to guide their company through a two-year asset assessment and redevelopment planning process that will result in the prominent riverfront parcel for its best use. The former Jeffboat site at one time was the site of the largest inland shipbuilding in the United States and the second-largest builder of barges until its' closing in 2018.

"ACBL and Jeffboat have been an integral part of the Jeffersonville Community for more than a century. Although we closed the Jeffboat shipbuilding facility in 2018 due to tough economic times, we are excited about the redevelopment and repurposing of this site going forward," said Mike Ellis, ACBL CEO. "We believe the end result will be a transformational water-



front mixed use space that ties into the other successes the City of Jeffersonville has completed on the waterfront and surrounding areas."

"We have approximately one mile of prime real estate right here in Jeffersonville. The possibilities are limitless. We're excited to team with ACBL to help develop a shared vision for this property," said Mayor Mike Moore who noted that he looks forward to working with ACBL and having community engagement meetings to hear from residents during the master planning process. "There's a rich history associated with Jeffboat in our city. But it's now time to write the next chapter in that story and it starts with a plan to transfer the former shipyard into a

catalyst for more growth and development in Jeffersonville."

OHM Advisors is a national firm with an office in Jeffersonville. The firm has experience in a diversity of large-scale, multifaceted waterfront redevelopment projects including the Riverfront Revitalization in Owensboro, Ky.

"Our team recognizes the great interest in this property and the need to balance the private sector economic needs of the property owner with that of the community interests," said Rob Huckaby, Director of the Louisville Office for OHM Advisors. "We look forward to putting forth a planning process that efficiently gathers public feedback to develop a market driven plan that makes sense."



GRANT WILL AIDE WASTEWATER PLANT EXPANSION

Mayor Mike Moore announced in August that the City of Jeffersonville will receive an additional \$5 million in funding from the Indiana Economic Development Commission (IEDC) for the expansion of the city's North Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The IEDC had already committed \$5 million for the \$45.4 million project that will double the capacity of the facility, which provides wastewater treatment services

to industries and businesses in the Jeffersonville section of River Ridge as well as about 10,000 acres outside the commerce center. "This is exciting news for the city. I'm thankful to the IEDC for supporting this project," said Moore. "We've been working hard to secure funding from various sources outside the city so we can make this expansion happen without placing a burden on the city's coffers. A \$10 million gift from the IEDC goes a long way in helping make that happen."

The entire expansion will increase the plant's overall capacity to six million gallons per day. River Ridge has been allocated two million gallons per day of that increased capacity as part of an agreement to provide \$12 million in funding for the expansion.

Other funding sources for the project include Clark County and the State of Indiana.



IN CASE YOU MISSED IT... Parking in downtown Jeffersonville got a little bit easier over the summer after the City completed a new public parking lot behind Colston Park. The lot brings an additional 92 parking spaces to downtown and is complete with LED lighting. The free parking can be accessed from W. Maple Street.

FLOOD MAP INFO AVAILABLE

The City of Jeffersonville participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and has adopted flood hazard area protection standards. As a public service, the City of Jeffersonville Building Commissioner's office will provide the following upon request:

BASIC FLOOD MAP INFO, INCLUDING:

- Whether a property is in or out of the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA).
- Zone, base flood elevation and panel reference information from the Flood Insurance Rate Map
- Copies of Elevation Certificates for certain improvements to properties located in floodplains
- Copies of Letters of Map Amendments (LOMAs) and Letters of Map Revisions (LOMRs) on file in our office
- A handout regarding the flood insurance purchase requirement that can help people seeking a mortgage or financing for a property located in the SFHA.

ADDITIONAL FLOOD MAP INFORMATION including floodways and requirements for development in a floodway.

INFORMATION ON PRIOR FLOODING at a particular site, if available.

Winning Story Trail author announced

SO YOU KNOW

THOSE COLORFUL FLAGS, EXPLAINED

We get A LOT of calls in the City of Jeffersonville from residents asking first, why there are colorful flags in their yard and, second, what the color of the flag means.

One short answer to "why" is: *Someone* is planning to do work of some kind in the vicinity in the near future that requires digging. The flags are in place so whomever is digging knows where the various underground utilities are located and can, thus, avoid them during excavation.

The appearance of these flags oftentimes is not a sign that the City in particular is planning a project in your area — so when residents call about flags in their neighborhood we may not always know what the project in question is. The excavation could be for anything, maybe the fire hydrant across the street is being repaired, a utility pole is being replaced or your next door neighbors are installing a new mailbox or clothes line ...

It's also possible the flags have appeared in your yard because someone is planning to do work. Engineers will request to have utilities marked out so that they can design new utility systems around the old ones. This practice is often referred to as Sub-surface Utility Engineering. If you happen to notice that these flags have shown up in

HELP US SHAPE JEFF'S FUTURE

After several years of remarkable growth and development, the City of Jeffersonville is embarking on a year-long effort to update its Comprehensive Plan. So much has been done since the city's last plan was drafted in 2015, but there is still much more to be done, new challenges to overcome, and new opportunities to explore.

Over the next year the City's Planning Staff will be collecting data, interviewing residents, talking to civic leaders, mapping trends, and determining a course of action for the city for the next 10-20 years. Once drafted, the Comprehensive Plan will be the City's new framework for growth, development, infrastructure, public policy, and more.

No one knows Jeff better than the folks who call it home, though, so we're going to need your help to pull this off the right way.

"I really believe Jeffersonville is a community," said Planning and Zoning Director Chad Reischl. "It's a community of people, of individuals, of families, of friends. It is really a team of all of us living and working together and that's why I think we all need to be part of this process."

The staff of our Planning and Zoning Department has been out and about over the last few months asking residents to participate in the process. Maybe you've seen them at a local festival, farmers market or grocery store? Maybe you've already shared your ideas? In case you haven't, you still have time!

The first step is to visit buildingjeff.com. Once you're there, you can read about the project and watch our videos explaining the process. Then, just click on "participate," take a look at our interactive map and start sharing your ideas. Basically we want to know what you love about Jeff, what you think we could be doing better and what you think the City should look like in the future.

The Jefferson — a music venue and event space — is now open in the former Rocky’s Italian Grill building at 715 W. Riverside Drive.


