

The Redevelopment Commission promotes and implements community projects, acting as a catalyst to develop blighted areas in need of reinvestment. This process is implemented via real estate acquisition, site preparation, and/or by providing public infrastructure to the site.

The Redevelopment Commission is comprised of five voting members two appointed by the Jeffersonville City Council and three appointed by the mayor. A sixth, non-voting member, sits on the Commission and is appointed by Greater Clark County School Corporation. The Commission meets the last Wednesday of each month at 4 p.m. in the Mayor's Conference Room on the 2nd floor of City Hall at 500 Quartermaster Court, Jeffersonville, IN 47130.


tiful escape right in our backyard.

A GROUNDBREAKING **GROUNDBREAKING**

In a monumental move for education and community development, Mayor Mike Moore and the Jeffersonville Redevelopment Commission proudly announced earlier this year a \$1-million contribution to Greater Clark County Schools that will go towards the construction of a state-ofthe-art Natatorium at Jeffersonville High School.

Moore was on hand with GCCS and Jeff High representatives in April to break ground on the \$33-million indoor swimming facility.

"This is a project everyone in the city can celebrate," Moore said. "The Natatorium puts Jeffersonville at the pinnacle of all high schools in Indiana".

The Natatorium will have ten 50-meter swim lanes, diving platforms, multiple fall and spring locker rooms, and coaches' offices. It will seat 1,000 people. Construction is expected to be completed by the 2026 school year.

"As a Jeff High grad myself, I'm proud to be a part of this," Redevelopment President Scott Hawkins said. "This contribution demonstrates our commitment to the students of Jeff High and their future."

City Council Member Evan Stoner voiced his approval. "I'm excited to see this complex built," Stoner said. "It will be an incredible tool to strengthen our students, as well as our city."

The Natatorium will have public hours, and GCCS is working with Norton Clark Hospital and other rehab facilities to use for water therapy.

"I'm 100 percent committed to our partnership with our schools," Moore said. "We have more dreams and ideas we want to invest in. Our goal is to become the number one school system in Indiana".

>> Dumpsters coming back to neighborhoods


After a brief delay following the tornadoes that roared through parts of Jeffersonville in April, the City's annual Spring dumpster drop-off program is back on track.

"As folks started cleaning up damage following the tornadoes, we decided it would be best to delay the dumpster drop-offs around the city and instead focus on putting those resources in the neighborhoods hard-hit by the storms," Mayor Mike Moore said. With the majority of storm debris removed, the City is now ready to roll out dumpsters city-wide. If a dumpster hasn't stopped by your neighborhood yet, don't worry. Over the next several weeks, dumpsters will be delivered to more than 100 locations in the city.

Dumpsters will be placed every Thursday and will be picked up on Monday. The drop-off schedule, with precise locations, will be released on the city's Facebook page every Tuesday so residents can prepare.

The Sanitation Department requests the following items NOT be disposed of in the neighborhood dumpsters:

- Paint
- Tires
- Appliances
- TVs
- Concrete and bricks

\$1.5M GRANT FOR ROADS

>> Neighborhoods are top priority

The City of Jeffersonville learned in April that it has been preliminarily awarded \$1.5-million in Community Crossings Matching Grant Funds by the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT).

INDOT's Community Crossings Matching Grant Program aims to provide financial assistance for road and bridge projects. The grant funds can cover up to 50 percent of the construction costs or the purchase of materials.

"With the help of this grant, the City of Jeff will be investing \$5-million in milling and paving city streets," Mayor Mike Moore said. "Most of those dollars will be used in neighborhoods throughout Jeffersonville."

Moore expressed his gratitude for the grant award.

"This funding will once again allow us to make significant strides in improving our city's infrastructure, ensuring smoother and safer roadways for our residents and visitors," Moore said. "We thank INDOT for their support and investment in our community."

The City of Jeffersonville submitted project applications for consideration. It was one of 252 communities across the state to receive some level of funding through the program.

With this grant, Jeffersonville will be able to address key infrastructure needs and enhance the quality of life for its residents. The city remains committed to responsible stewardship of these funds, ensuring they are utilized effectively to maximize their impact.



SHELTER PARTICIPATING IN MEGA REGIONAL ADOPTION EVENT MAY 11

The Jeffersonville Animal Shelter is thrilled to be a participant in this year's Hammer's Lou Adopts - a massive regional pet adoption event.

The event, sponsored by Isaacs & Isaacs Personal Injury Lawyers, is being coordinated by the Kentucky Humane Society and Louisville Metro Animal Services. It will be held Saturday, May 11 from noon to 4 p.m. at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center Pavilion.

Last year, 115 dogs found new homes during the on-site adoption event and the group is focused on placing even more dogs this year.

In addition to the Jeffersonville Animal Shelter, Kentucky Humane Society and Louisville Metro Animal Services, several other organizations are participating in Hammer's Lou Adopts, including: Adopt Me! Bluegrass Pet Rescue, Anderson County Care and Control, Animal Care Society, Hardin County Animal Care and Control, The Humane Society of Oldham County, MisPits and Friends and Shelby County Animal Control and Shelter to offer the public a large variety of friendly, loving adoptable local dogs and puppies.

Adoption fees will vary by participating shelters. All available dogs and puppies will be spayed or neutered, microchipped, and up-to-date on vaccinations.



Longtime shelter employee taking over director's role

She couldn't quite pin-point what career she was destined to dedicate her life to when she

headed off to college at Eastern Kentucky University, but Kristie Ashcraft knew she wanted to help people.

So, she earned a Bachelor's in Child and Family Studies. But it wasn't until she started working in admissions at the Kentucky Humane Society that she found her passion.

"As soon as I started at KHS I fell in love with animal welfare, being able to help people and their pets," Ashcraft said.

Fast forward nearly ten years later, she earned her Master's in Shelter Medicine from the University of Florida. Fast forward another year and a half later and Ashcraft is taking over as Director of the Jeffersonville Animal Shelter — a role she will officially fill on June 1.

Ashcraft has worked at the Jeffersonville shelter since 2013,

so she has seen a lot of changes at the facility in her time. She said she wants to build on the progress the shelter has made in expanding its foster and volunteer programs under its previous Director, Sarah Green.

"Sarah has really set the shelter on an amazing path and I want to keep building on that," Ashcraft said. "Over the last few years, it has been amazing to see our community become so involved in helping shelter pets."

In the immediate future, she said she is going to continue to focus on increasing reunions between lost pets and their families.

"Most dogs that enter the shelter are lost dogs," Ashcraft said.
"The quicker we can get them home, the more we can focus on the pets that really need us."

Focusing on keeping pets in their homes - through increasing programs that assist pet owners in emergency situations - is one of her long-term goals, as well as increasing access to spay/neuter services, vaccines and microchips.

DOWNTOWN

CITY ADOPTS OUTDOOR REFRESHMENT AREA

Jeffersonville has joined several other Indiana cities taking advantage of new State legislation allowing the creation of a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA).

The Jeffersonville City Council adopted Ordinance 2023-OR-72, creating a DORA, which allows people to purchase alcoholic beverages from approved businesses within the specified DORA and carry them outside to be consumed in other places within the DORA boundaries.

The goal behind the DORA legislation is to create a vibrant setting that promotes economic development and enhances the overall lifestyle experience in a specific area.

City officials say having a DORA will attract more visitors and draw more patrons to events and businesses.

"I believe this ordinance is meant exactly for the City of Jeffersonville," said Mayor Mike Moore. "We've shown an incredible ability to create outdoor activity with business, with quality of life and with fun events. To be able to have the full walking venue and being able to carry a beer around from festival to festival is exactly what our downtown needs."

Business participation within the DORA boundaries is voluntary. But those who choose to participate will be required to post signage indicating they are a DORA approved vendor and will also be required to serve beverages in designated DORA cups.

The City needs to post signage identifying the DORA boundaries, but officials say the DORA should be in effect later this spring.

JEFF LANDS RECORD INVESTMENTS

>> Two companies announce \$800M in development plans at River Ridge

History was made in Jeffersonville in October when Canadian Solar announced its plans to make an \$800 million investment in the city and build a new manufacturing plant at River Ridge.

At the time it was the largest single business investment in the city's history. Just a few months later, a second company - Meta - announced it, too, would be investing \$800 million to build a data center in Jeffersonville.

"It's a historic time in Jeffersonville," said Mayor Mike Moore.

META MOVING IN

In January, Mayor Mike Moore joined local and state leaders, including Governor Eric Holcomb, the River Ridge Development Authority, and One Southern Indiana Chamber & Economic Development to announce Meta's newest Data Center, which will be located in Jeffersonville at River Ridge Commerce Center.

Meta owns and operates Facebook, Instagram, Threads, and WhatsApp.

"What an honor it is to stand here and say Meta, welcome to Jeffersonville," Moore said. "Times have changed. We are now driven by technology."

This \$800-million investment will include a 619-acre campus with a nearly 700,000-square-foot facility. At peak construction, this project will create more than 1200 construction jobs.

Meta will employ 100 people in the tech field and will be fully supported

by renewable energy. Meta leaders praised Jeffersonville for its great access to infrastructure, renewable energy, strong talent, and community.

Governor Holcomb said this announcement positions Indiana to reach its goal of becoming the AI Capital of the Midwest.

CANADIAN SOLAR BRINGING JOBS

Canadian Solar is expected to start hiring the first of what will ultimately be 1,200 new positions later this year.

The jobs will be located at the company's solar module production facility in River Ridge, which is expected to begin production by the end of 2025.

The Jeffersonville plant is the company's second production facility in the United States and is an \$800 million investment, officials announced in October. It will produce approximately 20,000 high-power solar panels per day.

"Not only are they making a large financial investment in our community, but they will also become one of the largest single-site employers in the Greater Louisville region," Moore said. "We are thrilled to see a global industry leader join our commnity

and provide a product with enormous potential."

Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb said the state's strong manufacturing sector positions Indiana to help lead the global energy transition.

"Canadian Solar's location in Jeffersonville will put our skilled Hoosier workforce at the center of cultivating solar power," Holcomb said.
